





About the Office of Evensong

Evensong (Evening Prayer) is the Anglican derivation by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer (1489-1556) from the Roman canonical evening hours of Vespers and Compline. Following the English Reformation, Evensong (as well as the morning Office of Matins, Cranmer's compilation of the Roman hours of Matins, Lauds, and Prime) was sung daily in cathedral and collegiate churches to modified adaptations of traditional chant. These chants evolved into elaborate settings with improvised harmonies, and thus this music was written down for the Daily Offices. Eventually boys' voices joined the men's voices and countless composers seized the opportunity to write music for this unique sound. It is from the Daily Offices that comes the greatest wealth of our rich heritage of Anglican music. This evening we pray with song and with silence. We place before God our petitions and pray on behalf of all those who are not in attendance.

This evening's service is a commissioning service for the Choir as they are about to embark on a pilgrimage to England to serve as choir in residence for Ely Cathedral. This order of service is taken from The Book of Common Prayer, 1662, which is the Prayer Book the Choir will be using while in England.





Ely Cathedral

At the beginning of Evening Prayer the Minister shall read with a loud voice some one or more of these Sentences of the Scriptures that follow. And then the Minister shall say that which is written after the said Sentences.

Confession of Sin

The Officiant says to the people

Dearly beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloke them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy. And although we ought at all times humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul. Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart and humble voice unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me:

A general Confession to be said of the whole Congregation after the Minister, all kneeling.

Officiant Almighty and most merciful Father,

All We have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep,

We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts,

We have offended against thy holy laws,

We have left undone those things which we ought to have done,

And we have done those things which we ought not to have done,

And there is no health in us:

But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us miserable offenders;

Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults,

Restore thou them that are penitent,

According to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu our Lord:

And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake,

That we may hereafter life a godly, righteous, and sober life,

To the glory of thy holy Name. Amen

The Absolution or Remission of sins to be pronounced by the Priest alone, standing: the people still kneeling. Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness and live; and hath given power and commandment to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Wherefore let us beseech him to grant us true repentance and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him which we do at this present, and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The First Lesson: 1 Samuel 17:50 – 18:4

Reader: A Lesson from First Samuel.

So David prevailed over the Philistine with a sling and a stone, striking down the Philistine and killing him; there was no sword in David's hand. Then David ran and stood over the Philistine; he grasped his sword, drew it out of its sheath, and killed him; then he cut off his head with it.

When the Philistines saw that their champion was dead, they fled. The troops of Israel and Judah rose up with a shout and pursued the Philistines as far as Gath and the gates of Ekron, so that the wounded Philistines fell on the way from Shaaraim as far as Gath and Ekron. The Israelites came back from chasing the Philistines, and they plundered their camp. David took the head of the Philistine and brought it to Jerusalem; but he put his armour in his tent.

When Saul saw David go out against the Philistine, he said to Abner, the commander of the army, 'Abner, whose son is this young man?' Abner said, 'As your soul lives, O king, I do not know.' The king said, 'Inquire whose son the stripling is.' On David's return from killing the Philistine, Abner took him and brought him before Saul, with the head of the Philistine in his hand. Saul said to him, 'Whose son are you, young man?' And David answered, 'I am the son of your servant Jesse the Bethlehemite.'

When David had finished speaking to Saul, the soul of Jonathan was bound to the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. Saul took him that day and would not let him return to his father's house. Then Jonathan made a covenant with David, because he loved him as his own soul. Jonathan stripped himself of the robe that he was wearing, and gave it to David, and his armour, and even his sword and his bow and his belt.

All stand as the Choir sings the Magnificat.

The Second Lesson: Matthew 23:29-39

Reader: A Lesson from the Gospel of Matthew.

'Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you build the tombs of the prophets and decorate the graves of the righteous, and you say, "If we had lived in the days of our ancestors, we would not have taken part with them in shedding the blood of the prophets." Thus you testify against yourselves that you are descendants of those who murdered the prophets. Fill up, then, the measure of your ancestors. You snakes, you brood of vipers! How can you escape being sentenced to hell? Therefore I send you prophets, sages, and scribes, some of whom you will kill and crucify, and some you will flog in your synagogues and pursue from town to town, so that upon you may come all the righteous blood shed on earth, from the blood of righteous Abel to the blood of Zechariah son of Barachiah, whom you murdered between the sanctuary and the altar. Truly I tell you, all this will come upon this generation.

'Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing! See, your house is left to you, desolate. For I tell you, you will not see me again until you say, "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."

Reader: Here endeth the Lesson.

Silence is kept.

All stand as the Choir sings the Nunc dimittis.

O God, our heavenly Father, whose glory fills the whole creation, and whose presence we find wherever we go: Preserve the Choir in their travels; surround them with your loving care; protect them from every danger; and bring them in safety to their journey's end; through Jesus Christ our Lord. (Choir) *Amen*.

The Second Collect at Evening Prayer.

O God, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed: Give unto thy servants that peace which the world cannot give, that both our hearts may be set to obey thy commandments, and also that by thee we being defended from the fear of all enemies may pass our time in rest and quietness; through the merits of Jesus Christ our Saviour. (Choir) *Amen*.

The Third Collect, for Aid against all Perils.

Lighten our darkness, we beseech thee, O Lord; and by thy great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night; for the love of thy only Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. (Choir) *Amen*.

Choirmaster I present to you these people to be commissioned to represent the Church of

the Good Shepherd, the Diocese of Lexington, and the Episcopal Church as they travel to England to serve as Choir in Residence for Ely Cathedral




